- 30 The distinction proposed by this book differs in crucial respects from the three patterns of party competition of Aleks Szczerbiak and Paul Taggart. Indeed, the present typology is different from the one proposed by Taggart and Szczerbiak who focus mainly on Eurosceptic parties:
- limited contestation grouping instances of limited Euroscepticism (France, Germany, Italy, Belgium, The Netherlands, Luxembourg, Spain, Portugal, Finland, Ireland, Slovenia);
 - the open contestation characterised by the spectacular nature of Euroscepticism (UK, Greece, Sweden, Austria, Malta, Czech Republic, Denmark and Norway); and
 - the constrained contestation bringing together sensitive post-communist candidate states (Poland, Hungary, Slovakia, Latvia, Lithuania, Estonia).
