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Hospital in Germany and in Paris. At that time work like this was considered "unladylike". However, she decided to take her fate into her own hands, and soon she became an expert in England.

When the Crimean War began in 1854, she was asked to go to Scutari in Turkey and, in November, she arrived at the hospital with about thirty nurses. They took care of wounded soldiers. No woman had ever had such a position before. They faced terrible conditions; there were no medicines, no clean bedding. There was no proper drainage system and the smell was abominable; there was no hot water. Worse still, the doctors had no authority to make rules. The government departments provide what was needed, despite the most horrible circumstances, she was able to keep up her position. She saved the lives of these soldiers.

After the war she wrote a book about her experiences. Her book was well received by many hospitals in England. She opened a nursing school at St. Thomas' Hospital in London in 1860 and the nurses' home as well. The training, which was planned by her, set a new standard of discipline, good behaviour, and nursing skill. No nurse was admitted without a certificate of good character. She also wrote the first textbook for the new profession – "Notes of Nursing". It was translated into English, German and Italian. Thanks to her, before the end of the century nursing was thought of as one of the noble professions a woman could have.
