This shows that the manuscript would not have been accepted by the academic faculty in Münster University, who took great pains to ensure that Marxist philosophy was not officially endorsed from any other philosophical position. Author of this article was born (1930) after the fall of the Communist regime (1989), and only studied at universities from ("centrals").*
